





Asia is the planet's largest continent, Asia covers about 30 percent of the world's landmass and includes (44) countries. Asia is so big that it is divided into different sub-regions.








Highest point on earth, Mount Everest, is in Asia.

Mount Everest is the highest mountain on Earth above sea level, and the highest point on the Earth's crust.

The lowest point on land, the Dead Sea, is also in Asia.

Why is it called the Dead Sea?

It is called the Dead Sea because nothing lives in it. It is some of the saltiest water anywhere in the world, almost six times as salty as the ocean.



Why are Rainforests Important?



Rainforests are forests with tall trees, warm **climate**, and lots of rain.

Did You Know?

Why are rainforests important?



Rainforests are important because they:

- provide a home to many plants and animals.
- are a source for medicines and foods.
- are an interesting place to visit.

Most rainforests in Asia are found in **Indonesia**, **Malaysia**, and **Thailand**. Southeast Asia's rainforests are some of the oldest on Earth. Some scientists believe that forests in Malaysia may have existed over 100 million years ago.

Did you know?

An area of a rainforest the size of a football field is being destroyed each second.



Why are Rainforests being destroyed?

Many areas of the rainforests are being **destroyed** every year by **Humans**. People are cutting down rainforests for many reasons. Some of these reasons are:



They cut wood for both making fire and furniture.



They use land for growing crops.



They use land for their cattle to graze.




They use land for road construction

Let's do everything we can to save them.


Lesson Three: The Himalayas

The snow leopard is found in the high mountains of Central Asia and especially the Himalayas.



The **Himalayas** are the highest mountains in the world. They were given the name Himalaya which means "home of snow ", because snow never melts on their high **peaks**. The Himalayas form 9 of the 10 highest peaks in the world.



Among these peaks is the world's highest mountain, Mount Everest.




Being the world's highest mountains, the Himalayas are the greatest **attraction** to climbers throughout the world.

2- Nepalese Himalayas: in Nepal.


3- Tibetan Himalayas: in Tibet in China.





The Arabian Peninsula is located in southwest Asia.

The three bodies of water that surrounding the Arabian Peninsula are the Red Sea, the Arabian Gulf, and the Indian Ocean.

What countries does it cover?

The Arabian Peninsula is divided into the following Arab countries:

The Kingdom of Saudi Arabia Bahrain Kuwait Oman Qatar United Arab Emirates Yemen



The Kingdom of Saudi Arabia covers most of the Arabian Peninsula. The majority of the population of the peninsula lives in Saudi Arabia and in Yemen.

The Arabian Peninsula has no lakes, rivers or forests. The Arabian Peninsula receives very little rain, so the climate of Arabia is hot and dry, and therefore few wild animals live in it. Why is the Arabian Peninsula important to the Arabs?






Lesson Two: Petra

Where is Petra?


Petra is located outside the town of Wadi Mousa in southern Jordan.

Who built Petra?



What does the name Petra mean?


The name Petra means the city of rock. It was called so because it was carved in stone.



Taj Mahal is in the city of Agra in India. Taj Mahal is one of the main tourist attractions in India.


Who built Taj Mahal?

"The Great Wall of China was built over 2,000 years ago, by Qin, the first emperor of China."






Why was the Great Wall of China built?

Chinese New Year starts with the New Moon on the first day of the New Year and ends on the full moon 15 days later. The 15th day of the New Year is called the Lantern Festival, which is celebrated at night with lantern displays

More food is consumed during the Chinese New Year celebrations than any other time of the year. Families may eat a whole fish to represent togetherness. They may eat chicken which must be presented with a head, tail and feet to symbolize completeness.


Prior to New Year's Day, Chinese families decorate their living rooms with vases.
